The children's driving motivation is the unwavering love for their father and mother. I loved the relentless pace and the short chapters finishing on cliff hangers. You just can't stop reading it. Rachel Klein is the heart of the book. While she starts as a quiet figure in the shadows, her bravery blossoms until she can fiercely rebel for Krasnia and act as the book's protector. Her brother Robert Klein, compassionate, anchors the emotional core which makes you deeply invested in every step they take.

David Farr's choice of vocabulary is sophisticated and richly textured, and his description is highly visual. He uses sharp sensory detail to draw readers into a place that feels both fantastical and eerily familiar. His powerful language provides a contrast to bring Krasnia's bleakness into life.

The key themes and messages in this book are that imagination and memory are forms of freedom. Stories are powerful: one book can change the fate of a nation. It also speaks to the importance of loyalty and reminds readers that no matter what, you are never alone.

Overall, I would rate it 5 stars and recommend this book to brave dreamers seeking adventure, sparking unforgettable courage. Reading this book is an emotional rollercoaster. It makes you feel tense and anxious during chase scenes, but it also leaves you feeling hopeful.
